Sheriff Bobby F. Kimbrough, Jr. was elected to office in 2018. His passionate commitment to serving others, coupled with his diverse career experiences in law enforcement, give him a unique vision for the Office of Sheriff.

Born and raised in Forsyth County, Bobby graduated from North Forsyth High School before earning his Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from High Point University in 1991. Bobby then earned his master's degree in Leadership from Piedmont International University in 2020. Bobby is currently working towards his Ph.D. in Organizational Leadership.

Bobby began his law enforcement career in 1984 as a Police Officer for the Winston-Salem Police Department. In 1987, he became an Arson Investigator with the Winston-Salem Fire Department while serving in the role of Assistant Fire Marshal. He then moved to work with high-risk offenders at the North Carolina Department of Probation and Parole. From 1995 to 2016, Bobby served the United States Department of Justice as a Special Agent in the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). He specialized in investigating crimes against the government, including organized crime, money laundering, gang violence, and drug trafficking. Various certifications, including Department of Justice Instructor, and his fluency in Spanish afforded him the opportunity to work extensively throughout the United States of America and other Spanish speaking countries.

Bobby has nearly 40 years of law enforcement experience and brings his professional experiences and personal passions to projects throughout the community. As an active community leader, he founded Branded for Knowledge, a program focusing on strengthening, empowering, and encouraging individuals to reach their full potential. He has also established the Star of Hope Scholarship Fund with the Winston-Salem Foundation to assist students who have been victims of a serious crime. Bobby continues to hone his leadership skills, completing the Dale Carnegie Course, Skills for Leadership. Bobby also completed Becoming a Leader: Developing Your Style and Making Sound Decisions, and Emotional Intelligence in Leadership courses from Harvard University in 2020.

As the first African-American Sheriff of Forsyth County, Sheriff Kimbrough has worked to improve the relationship between the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office and the community, building bridges, and enhancing the work already being done by the team members at the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. Despite his numerous accolades, including being an Author of three (3) books, Bobby considers being a single parent raising seven (7) sons as responsible, respectful young men to be his greatest accomplishment. In his spare time, Sheriff Kimbrough enjoys flying, reading, and spending time with his seven (7) sons.

Chief Deputy Rocky Joyner began his career with the Town of Kernersville in 1988. He worked Patrol while at the Kernersville Police Department. Chief Joyner started in 1992 with the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office.


Throughout his career, he has been assigned to various areas within the agency to include being a School Resource Officer, Patrol, Criminal Investigations, Civil & Support Services, and Administration. Chief Joyner returned to the Kernersville Police Department in 2010 where he worked as a patrol officer, a patrol Sergeant and retired in February 2018 as a Sergeant in the Special Operations Division.





Professional Standards

The Professional Standards Division consists of the Internal Affairs Section, and the Training Section. These sections function to ensure the continued delivery of professional law enforcement services to the community and maintain the integrity of the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office.

The Internal Affairs (IA) Section conducts administrative investigations involving staff members assigned to all bureaus within the agency and reports findings directly to the Sheriff, Chief Deputy, and Bureau Commanders. The section ensures fairness during each review with an emphasis on consistency while taking allegations of personnel misconduct seriously. The Internal Affairs Section received and investigated 66 complaints and/or concerns in 2021 which involved 66 staff members.





Field Services: Patrol



Animal Services Field Operations

The Animal Services Division is responsible for investigating animal complaints and filing charges, either civil or criminal, for violation(s) of state laws and local ordinances related to animals. Animal regulations are governed by North Carolina State law and locally by Forsyth County Code Chapter 6 – Animals. The Animal Services Division works in partnership with the Forsyth Humane Society who cares for all dogs and cats that are brought to the animal shelter by officers. All other animals are cared for by staff members assigned to the Animal Services Division. The Animal Services Division also works closely with the Forsyth County Animal Advisory Board to ensure local ordinances reflect current views so that regulations are enforceable when determined. The Animal Services Division sponsors multiple low-cost rabies clinics and spay/neuter vouchers which are issued to low-income families for dogs and/or cats to be spayed/neutered by local veterinarians in an effort to reduce the pet population

Real Time Intelligence Center & Crime Analysis

Real Time Intelligence Center (RTIC)



RTIC is a centralized technology center that assists in gathering, analyzing, and investigating intelligence in order to more effectively deploy resources. We are the first Sheriff's Office in the state of North Carolina to have its own RTIC. Multiple unique software programs work together to provide deputies with comprehensive intelligence. RTIC not only aids in identifying crime patterns but also ultimately prevents crime, ensuring a safer community for all. RTIC staff members relay information to deputies real-time while they are responding to a call. Investigators can request information from a wide network of community stakeholders.

Crime Analysis

Our Crime Analysts perform tactical, strategic and operational analysis for the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office. They assess emerging crime trends by analyzing data, and also assist with identifying suspects. Our two Crime Analysts utilize crime statistics to identify patterns and develop strategies to assist law enforcement with combatting criminal activities.

Investigative Services Sex Offender Registry

As a statutorily mandated function of the Sheriff's Office, the Sex Offender Registry Unit (SORU) is responsible for ensuring compliance with Article 27A of the North Carolina General Statutes. Specifically, this is the registration of persons convicted of a sex offense or certain offenses against minors and the enforcement of applicable statutes. This unit also serves as a liaison between the public and law enforcement concerning relevant laws or inquiries about registered offenders. Although not mandated by statute, the SORU conducts random checks on registered offenders in Forsyth County to ensure compliance with the requirements of the registry. The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office has implemented one of the most proactive programs in North Carolina in an effort to ensure registry compliance

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office School Resource Officer (SRO) program was established in 1974, making it the longest continuing SRO program in North Carolina. The SRO program has proven to be extremely successful in reducing criminal incidents in our schools. Currently the School Resource Officer program serves twelve high schools and eleven middle schools, as well as one location that is a combined high school and middle school.

Special Investigative Services Specialized Teams

The Special Investigative Services Division is comprised of multiple specialized teams. These teams include the Dignitary Protection Detail, the Interdiction Team, the Narcotics Unit, Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT), the Tactical High Risk Apprehension Team (THRAT), and the Task Force Officer Unit. The investigations and operations performed by the SISD range from infiltrating drug and human trafficking organizations, intercepting contraband during travel, serving high risk arrest and search warrants, protecting dignitaries inside Forsyth County, and working larger multi state cases with our federal partners. These partners include the FBI, ATF, USMS, DEA, and HSI. These operations require dedicated teamwork from several teams simultaneously. The SISD team structure allows for a collective attack on crime outside the realm of normal criminal investigations.

Judicial Services Civil Section

Pursuant to the Constitution of North Carolina and the North Carolina General Statutes, the Office of the Sheriff is empowered to maintain security of the Courts and to serve and enforce all Civil Orders issued by the Courts within Forsyth County. The Civil Section consists of five units; Process Service, Evictions, Executions, Domestic Violence, and Process Intake Unit. The Process Service Unit serves court processes to include Summons, Subpoenas, Notice of Hearings, Orders to Show Cause, Orders for Arrest and Child Custody Orders. The Evictions Unit primarily serves Magistrate Summons for Summary Ejectment and Writs of Possession of Real Property. The Executions Unit serves Orders of the Court that involves the seizure of assets to satisfy a monetary judgement. The Domestic Violence Unit primarily serves 50B orders. The Process Intake Unit is responsible for accurately receiving, processing and assigning all civil and criminal processes to the appropriate officers for service.

Judicial Services Court Security

The primary responsibility of the Court Security Section is to oversee the safety and security of everyone that crosses the threshold of the Forsyth County Hall of Justice and the Kernersville Court facility. Deputies are responsible for maintaining order during court and providing security for the judicial staff and clerks while court is in session. In the event an evacuation situation should occur, the Court Security Section is responsible for evacuating everyone from the building, including the inmates. Along with the safety and security of everyone in the building, the Court Security Section is responsible for transporting inmates to court from the Law Enforcement Detention Center.

Fingerprinting is conducted as a courtesy by the Sheriff's Office.




Forsyth County Law Enforcement Detention Center

The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Detention Center is an adult maximum security (400,000 square feet) detention facility that houses male and female sentenced misdemeanor and pretrial inmates. The facility is an eleven-story high rise structure containing 735 modular steel cells (276 double bunked and 464 single cells) to accommodate a total of 1,016 inmates.

Regardless of the reason for someone being held in the Sheriff's custody, certain services must be provided. In many ways the jail is its own city. The following is a list of some of the services provided to inmates at the Detention Center:

- Food Services
- Healthcare Services
- Laundry Services
- Mail Services
- Commissary Services
- Educational Services
- Religious Services
- Transportation Services
- All necessary steps to incarcerate a subject may be accomplished at the Detention Center, including alcohol breath testing, arrest warrant issuance, and complete subject identification.



Detention Bureau Security Services

The Security Services Division is responsible for continuous operation of the facility and the security of inmates. Areas of responsibilities include Detention Security Teams, Special Response Team (SRT), Classification, Special Housing Unit, Locks and Keys, Community Court Services, Gang Intelligence Program and inmate discipline hearings. To maintain control and order, inmates are housed based on their current charges, past experiences within the facility and evaluation during the intake and classification process.

Forsyth County Sheriff's Office Index Crime

Index Crime includes the total number of violent crimes (murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault) and property crimes (burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft). The Forsyth County Sheriff's Office reports crime data based on categories and definitions conforming to National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) standards in which crimes per incidents are reported. The agency converted their reporting systems in July of 2020 to follow this recommended system by the FBI. The following charts and tables report all crime using the NIBRS method. The total number of victims is counted in murder, rape, and aggravated assault. The total number of incident charges is counted in robbery, burglary, and larceny.


